# **Loving Earth Project News**

Welcome to this is the first newsletter from the Loving Earth Project. Some of you may have contacted us a long time ago, and others have only just found us. With the measures in place due to COVID-19 we are adjusting to new ways of working and we are grateful for your patience.

#### Origins of the project

The Loving Earth Project started about a year ago for an art exhibition at Swarthmoor Hall, Ulverstone, organised under the auspices of the Quaker Arts Network. The *Seeking Routes* exhibition was a group exhibition by diverse Quaker artists and this project enabled a wider group of people to be involved, using the creative process to help us explore how our spiritual values of love and truth might help us to address the environmental crisis and how we might engage with it.

People found the project a helpful and fun way to engage with their concerns about the environment, so we have developed it as an ongoing community project open to all. We know that continuing with 'business as usual' is not the answer, and that radical changes are needed but many of us feel confused and don't know what to do. Others may already be actively engaged with environmental issues and feel overwhelmed, anxious and/or worn out. The loving Earth offers a way to rest and regenerate our energy and spirits while still helping to turn the tide of public opinion by making something beautiful and showing example of creative actions.

#### New shoots in many directions

In recent months we have held quiet times for creative and prayerful reflection, events for local Quaker groups and churches, 'sew and chat' events in local libararies and our first school visit. We have discussed, embroidery, plastic waste, and concerns for ourselves and future



generations, often finding it easier to talk with people outside our immediate daily lives before



discussing with our nearest and dearest. People have made some beautiful panels and written movingly about them. Many of the panels have already been shown at several events, including an arts centre, a WI conference, a green fair, local public libraries, and various Quaker venues. A school visit with year 5 children changed their anxiety and horror about deforestation in the Amazon into positive actions. They each chose an action they wanted to take such as eating less beef, avoiding palm oil in chocolate or biscuits, talking with their parents about their carbon footprint, or raising money to support the protection of forests.

#### Exhibitions, workshops and the Coronavirus shutdown

Plans for exhibitions and events an art gallery in Walton on Thames, an international conference in Paris, an interfaith event in Glasgow in the next few months are on hold as a result of the coronavirus pandemic. The Loving Earth Project is ideally suited for people to join from home while in quarantine, and we are developing additional resources to support this. A guided meditation is now available at <a href="https://www.woodbrooke.org.uk/lovingearth">https://www.woodbrooke.org.uk/lovingearth</a> to help people get started with the project, and the <a href="lovingearth-project.uk">lovingearth-project.uk</a> website has a variety of other resources and links to explore inspire and inform. There are lots of 'how to' videos on the internet to help with sewing or other textile techniques. You might like to share your favourites via our Facebook page or to email us further suggestions. We also hope to provide further resources including Zoom meetings to share our textile work-in-progress or thoughts about sustainability matters etc. We also hope to translate of some of the key information into different languages - volunteers to help with this would be welcome.



We welcome textile panels from anyone, in any style, provided that they are 30x 30cm in size, robust enough to be put in the post, and are accompanied by an explanatory text.

Due to the current Coronavirus close down, we are currently asking that no panels are sent in to us and that you keep them with you until we are able to receive them once again. Meanwhile, please email us photos of your panels, your name and contact details, and a short text to accompany each panel. We can then display your work on our website and will let you know when we are ready to receive them again after the Coronavirus shutdown.

More information about making panels is on our website and a .pdf document introducing to the project and with key information about making panels is attached. Please print it off for reference and to share with others.

The project can be adapted in many ways and it would be lovely to develop more resources for specific groups - such as young people, especially online resources at present. We have a small team of facilitators able to run a wide range of Loving Earth Project workshops, adapted to the needs of a wide range of circumstances, but are currently feeling our way with the Coronavirus shutdown.
